


Some twenty adults and children gathered for the Remembrance Sunday service the War Memorial. The service was led by Rev Dave Battison, Curate of Holy Trinity Church. Wreaths were laid by Michael Wilderspin, Vice-Chair of the Parish Council and Shelby and Lucy Hirstwood, on behalf of the children of Holy Trinity School, Matlock Bath. A presentation was given by Charles Beresford, local historian of the village, on two of the men remembered, Maurice and Charles Morten. The hymns were accompanied by musicians from the Wirksworth Area Community Orchestra, one of whom sounded the Last Post and Reveille. A copy of the presentation is on page 2 of this Newsletter.

## Come, come a carolling ...





## Pavilion - 99 not out but what does the future hold?

Matlock Bath Pavilion is 100 years old next year. The District Council, who are the owners, have put out a consultation document on the future of the building. The Parish Council is one of the leaseholders of part of the building namely the Community Centre. Currently this is the only area available to the residents of Matlock Bath to meet. It also houses the Playgroup and Toddler Group. It is important that whatever happens to the Pavilion, the residents of Matlock Bath are not deprived of a Community Centre. We hope to make residents aware of any meetings arranged to discuss the Pavilion by advertising them on the Parish Council Notice Boards outside the Community Centre and at Artists' Corner. If you are interested in participating in these discussions please contact Bill, the Parish Clerk. Full details of the DDDC consultation are on their website or available from the Town Hall.

Though the District Council agreed in principle to the consultation on 5<sup>th</sup> November, they have only just published the details and dates. The closing date for submissions was 18<sup>th</sup> December, giving just 3 weeks to formulate a response, but after lobbying from the Parish Council, they have agreed to accept submissions up until 15<sup>th</sup> January 2010.



# The Bath at War by Charles Beresford

When the War Memorial was unveiled on 1<sup>st</sup> May 1921, and again when it was rededicated after the Second World War, the people of Matlock Bath who gathered had fresh memories of those whose names are commemorated – their sons, brothers, husbands, neighbours or colleagues.

Time has thinned the ranks of those with any memories of these men and we are now reaching the stage where for most people who stop to look at the inscriptions they are just a list of names with no other meaning than that they all died fighting for King and Country.

The stories of the men from Matlock Bath who served their country and perished in the Great War are now preserved for future generations but the lives of those who paid the ultimate sacrifice in the Second World War have yet to be recorded.

Time does not permit us to consider all 10 men whose names are recorded here from the 1939-45 war, but let us for a moment consider the lives of two men whose names are picked out in lead lettering – the Morton Brothers – Charles and Maurice.

They both lived with their parents on Fairview Terrace and as youngsters would have walked along the Parade and would have known this War Memorial. Charles was 10 years older than Maurice and had been a Scoutmaster. He joined the Royal Artillery.

Maurice joined the Royal Navy in June 1940 and became a submariner. He was posted to HMS Unique which, on 7<sup>th</sup> October 1942, slipped out of Holy Loch for a patrol in the Bay of Biscay. Contact was lost with her on 9<sup>th</sup> October and she was never heard or seen again. Maurice died with the other 33 brave men of her crew.

Charles went out to Burma and was reported missing fighting the Japanese on 1<sup>st</sup> April 1944. He has no known grave.

Like all of the 32 men whose names are on our War Memorial, Maurice and Charles gave the lives for "our tomorrows" and should be remembered with honour and gratitude.

# The Disappearing Postbox

We are sorry to report we have no good news on the disappearing post box from North Parade. Despite the best attempts of many to retrieve it, Royal Mail have reported to us that they felt it was not needed and unfortunately it got damaged when they removed it. Royal Mail feels that there are enough post boxes in the village without this one. We believe, however, there is a need for a post box at the north end of the village and think we have found a site for it near the bottom of Holme Road. The Parish Council will lobby for a post box to be re-instated but we are considered just one voice. We would encourage all those who used the post box on North Parade before it was removed to contact Royal Mail and lobby for a replacement.

The closure of the Post Office in the village was a serious loss to services in the village and this is just another loss. I am sure with a concerted effort, we should be able to get this service reinstated. ## Grass Roots Democracy

Councillor Garry Purdy gives an insight into Local Government.

#### Part 1

England has two patterns of local government in use. In some areas such as Derbyshire, there are tiers of local government with a **County Council** responsible for areas such as child services and education, waste management, trading standards, public transport and highways, social care, strategic planning and libraries and the arts. There is then a second tier with several **District Councils** within the county of Derbyshire (in Matlock Bath, it is Derbyshire Dales) responsible for areas such as housing, the environment, pollution and noise, parks, street cleaning, waste collection and recycling, leisure facilities, licensing, parking and local planning. Some areas, however, only have one tier of local government and these are dubbed **unitary authorities**. An example of this is Derby City.

Councils such as counties, districts and unitaries are known as **principal** local authorities in order to differentiate them in their legal status from the third tier of local government – **Parish and Town Councils.** A District Council area may be divided into several civil parishes. Matlock Bath has a **Parish Council** whereas Matlock has a **Town Council.** 

The current arrangement of local government in England is the result of a range of incremental measures which have their origins in the municipal reform of the 19<sup>th</sup> century. During the 20<sup>th</sup> century, the structure of local government was reformed and rationalised, with local government areas becoming fewer and larger and the functions of local councils amended. The way local authorities are funded has also been subject to periodic and significant reform.

Councillors cannot do the work of the council themselves, and so are responsible for the appointment and oversight of paid officers, who are delegated to perform most tasks. Local authorities nowadays have to appoint a "Chief Executive Officer", with overall responsibility for council employees and who operates in conjunction with department heads.

In some areas much of the work previously undertaken directly by council employees has been privatised.

Local councils are funded by a combination of **central government** grants, **Council Tax** (a locally set tax based on house value), Business Rates and fees and charges from certain services including decriminalised parking enforcement. The proportion of revenue that comes from Council Tax is low, meaning that if a council wishes to increase its funding modestly, it has to put up Council Tax by a large amount. Central Government retains the right to "can" Council Tax if it deems it to be too much. This has been an area of debate in British politics for many years, with councils and central government blaming each other for council tax rises.

In the next edition of the Newsletter, we look at the history of Parish Councils.

## Online Resources on the Derbyshire County Council Website

A variety of online information is accessible via the Derbyshire County Council Website. It includes sixteen of the most reputable reference sites. If you are a member of the library, you can access all free of charge.

Go to <a href="www.derbyshire.gov.uk/24hrlibrary">www.derbyshire.gov.uk/24hrlibrary</a> and log on. You need a Library Membership card number with the prefix DCC, eg DCC665402800. Follow the instructions on the screen.

Included are sources covering dictionaries, biography, business, newspapers and magazines, art, music, literature, current affairs, law, British Standards and more. Those fond of the written word can use Infotrac Newspapers and Journals databases, which gives access to 10 national newspapers and 50 journals and magazines going back to 1985. They also feature The Times from 1785 and the British Library Newspapers database including the Derby Mercury from 1800-1900. Use 'Who's Who and Who Was Who' to find out about famous and influential people back to 1898! Wanting to develop your business? Use COBRA, a business encyclopedia covering all aspects of starting and running a business

For children, there's extra homework help on the Britannica and World Book encyclopaedia websites.
